The kitchen renovation was our biggest project during 2007, both in terms of time and money.


Michelle assured everyone that the new kitchen was a bargain. But then there were the new appliances, the floor sanding, the plumbing, the electrical work and all of the restoration work.


are yet to hear the results of. For her birthday she got a guitar, so now she can be a musician as well as a singersong writer

We planted out about 100 native tree seedlings in July, which have all come to nought. We have lost a few well established trees around the house. Some of the gums are doing very well despite the lack of rain.

We have pretty well converted the bath to a full time grey water reservoir. It gets filled from buckets in the shower and keeps the garden alive.

There has not been any significant inflow into the rainwater tanks. Shame, as we invested \$6,000 in a new tank. The only water that it has seen is the regular tanker loads from town.

We are rationed to a tanker every other month. We even invested in a front load washing machine based solely on the fact it uses a third of the water of the top loader. Anyone want an as new top loading washing machine?

The sheep continued to multiply. We had 5 lambs this year. Three of last year's lambs have been consigned to the freezer. A first for us.

The girls were pretty good about the whole thing. They realise that having animals means certain things and they even help catch the lambs for the inevitable tail rings.

Had one of the sheep get fly struck in November. Steve diligently clipped all the wool, applied the fly strike powder and the sheep promptly died. Another first. They have since been shorn.

We lost Bingo, the faithful old Muscovy drake, to a fox earlier in the year. That was a bit of a blow. It was our fault as we forgot to lock the fowls in.


We have nearly finished the fence around the house. At the present rate we expect it to be completed about 2011.
