After 80 years Alan Caldwell Jewell finally called it a day on 1 March this year, passing away in the Tallangatta Hospital.

Alan grew up in Granya, a small town on the Murray River in Victoria. In 1961 he moved to Gilgandra in NSW to take up a sheep/wheat farm which he worked until 2001, when he retired to Tallangatta, just down the road from where he was raised. His health slowly deteriorated and he was a resident in the Tallangatta Hospital from mid-2007.

Alan had been active in the Gilgandra Historical Society and became active in the Granya Historical Society. After the funeral we all went over to Granya to have a look around and visited the Granya Museum, which was being tended by one of Alan's old school friends.

It was very poignant for the kids to look around and see all the old photos of the Jewell kids growing up in Granya in the 1930s and doing their after school activities. Calf Club was a bit of a contrast to tap dancing!

Alan was active in the Boy Scouts when he was in Granya and a Scout Master for some years in Gilgandra. The Scout Hut on the left was used by Alan in his younger days and has been refurbished in recent years.
