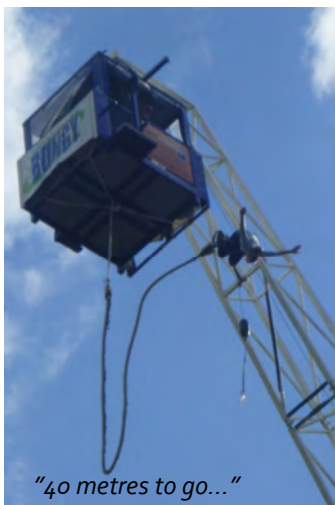

Last year we wrote that Steve was hoping for a quiet period in January, as he was acting Managing Director again. Not exactly quiet!

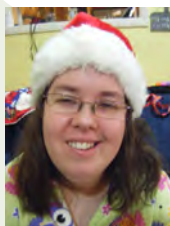


Next door neighbour under 1.5 metres of water!
